

THE SIXTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF NEW ZEALAND FOUNDERS SOCIETY PRESENTED BY THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

The past year has been one of steady consolidation for the Society. We were relieved to be told that we do not have to vacate our premises when our present lease expires in June. Our rooms are comfortable, central and having one of them leased makes them more affordable, so we are pleased that we are ensconced there for another year at least.

June is Heritage Month for the Wellington Region and as a Heritage Society we belong to the Greater Wellington Regional Heritage Promotion Council and participate in Heritage Month activities. Last year the theme was "Love" and we attended the Heritage Month Opening at the National Film Archives mediaplex. This year the theme is "Music" and the Upper Hutt City Council is hosting the opening at their new Expressions of Art and Culture Centre. This theme has proved very popular and there is a multitude of exhibitions, events and happenings throughout the month. Founders' contribution includes a display on the mezzanine floor of the Central Library from June 25-29. and the opening of our rooms to the public each Tuesday from 10.00 am-12.00 noon with the offer of tea and coffee to anyone wanting access our library with its wealth of genealogical and historical material

As a result of comments expressed at last year's National Council we have had the library expertly valued. The value is conservatively estimated at \$36,500.00. The library and our rooms will, of course, be open during National Council's representatives' visit to Wellington.

We now have our domain name and email facility with a website being developed which we hope will bring our Society much more in focus allowing our library and shipping lists to be more utilised and our Society more widely known.

Adhering to our former decision we have not awarded a Research Grant this year. Last year we gave the Award to Ian Dougherty of Dunedin whose work on The Vauxhall Gardens, Dunedin is soon to be published.

In November 2005 we learned that the Wellington City Council was planning to restore the William Wakefield Memorial beside the Basin Reserve, prompted largely by a letter from the Founders' Wellington Branch deploring the dilapidated state the memorial was in.

Submissions were called for and both the Executive and Wellington Branch responded, opting for the placement in a more frequented public area such as the Bolton Street Memorial Gardens or the Botanical Gardens. However, the Council has opted to place the Memorial in its original position, inside the Basin Reserve, on top of the mound. In a letter to us the Council writes,

"We will be replacing the existing wooden gates at the bottom of the egress steps with new metal gates which will allow better viewing of the memorial. We will also be putting in appropriate interpretation panels beside the memorial as well as beside the gates to explain the history behind William Wakefield and his memorial."

The restoration and replacement of the memorial is expected to be completed by the end of July.

Only one application for our Research Award was received in 2005 and no award was made. The committee feels that the award needs to be advertised to a target audience, and the Ministry of Culture and Heritage has agreed

to add our Research Award to its award listing which will give it a wider and more appropriate audience.

As ever, the Branches are the backbone of the Society, and we hope by continuing publicity, the increasing importance of our website and active canvassing by existing Founders, that we can attract more members, particularly from our own families, and keep the profile of our Society high.

It is encouraging to note that the heritage movement has gained momentum and increased status, resulting in a greater appreciation of what our ancestors established and a determination to retain what they valued.

Finally we remember those of us who have passed away or who have resigned because of age or ill-health. It is with regret that we note in particular the sudden passing of Murray Moorehead on 7 November 2005. Murray had been secretary to the Taranaki Branch since 1993. Sadly our National Secretary, Janet Robinson, suffered the sudden passing of her husband, John, in March 2006. Our sincere sympathy goes to Janet and both families.

We have a very competent National Executive Committee, and together with Janet's knowledge, we will ensure that Founders continues to thrive and stay in good heart.






AROUND THE BRANCHES

this address was the large number of questions our members asked of Bill and his interesting answers.



Your comments are welcome.


Once more I ask you to encourage family and friends who are interested in New Zealand early history, to bring them along to one of our outings. We will be delighted to meet them.

NEW ZEALAND FEDERATION OF HISTORICAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE MARCH 2006

This year the conference was hosted by the Foxton Historical Society.

Friday night 24th March, saw delegates, observers and friends get together at a special informal meet and greet evening. Verbal resumes of Club activity during the past year were given by each delegate present and proved very interesting. Some clubs have been incredibly active - relocating historic buildings, setting-up museums, etc. whilst others have fostered a more low key interest in our heritage. All have been working toward the same goals, although in different ways.

Saturday saw Conference Registration followed by the Official Opening by President Robin Astridge.

The AGM ran through reasonably quickly and all affiliated groups will receive details in the minutes.

Robin Astridge was re-elected President with Kenneth Stringer Vice-President. Noeline Shaw again accepted the responsibilities of Treasurer. There were no nominations for Secretary and the position has been left open with Kenneth working as Minute Secretary and Robin as Correspondence Secretary.

Following on from information, suggestions and requests made by Societies when they completed the special survey sent out to each of the 40 member groups the Executive are actively

pursuing an annual grant of \$50,000 from the Cultural and Heritage Department held by the Prime Minister, Helen Clark. A letter has been forwarded to her requesting a meeting.

Another responsibility for the Executive is to investigate a proposal made to the meeting that a special 'seeding' grant be made available to member Societies who are actively instigating, researching and writing history pertaining to various regions. This seeding grant to be a set proportion taken from the current investment money held by the Federation. The grant would be in the form of a loan and repayable immediately sufficient sales of the book/paper/leaflet have been generated to make it self-sufficient.

A special vote of thanks was passed to Phil Andrews for the work he has done for the very successful Legacy publication. His constant work and the first-class publication has been fully appreciated over the years. Phil has advised that he will be resigning as Editor after the publication of the next two issues.

Several members presented details of historical books they have had published during the past twelve months.

Saturday's business concluded with the usual dinner followed by a fascinating and informative visit to Mavtech, the Museum of Audio Visual technology. This museum houses one of the most unique collections representing New Zealand's audio, visual and artistic heritage. After viewing many of the exhibits we were entertained with a selection of National Film Unit films, etc.

Some delegates had to return to their home towns but those still in Foxton enjoyed a number of special activities, including visiting the historic Manawatu Printery, the de Molen Windmill,

Trolley Bus Museum (with rides in both the trolley bus and double-decker) dolls Gallery and Murals Tour.

It is anticipated that the 2007 Conference will be at Pleasant Point in the South Island.
