

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THE SIXTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW ZEALAND FOUNDERS SOCIETY PRESENTED BY THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Whilst having been a member of the New Zealand Founders Society for several years, I find myself humbled by the extent of knowledge and skills of those people who I am now working with in my role as President. There is such a depth of knowledge by so many people and it plays such a big role in keeping our heritage alive.

We are all aware of the declining numbers of our Society and no doubt some are questioning our relevance and the role that we play but I think it is even more important now that we remember, discover, and record the stories of our ancestors and the trials and tribulations that affected them in settling into this wonderful country.

In 2014 the Founders Society will be celebrating their 75th Anniversary and it may be appropriate to mark this occasion on a grand scale. Already we have had a wonderful idea put forward from one of the Branches which the committee is following up on and which can be discussed at the AGM next month. Any further suggestions are most welcome.



We were dismayed to learn that the Young Founders was not mentioned in any way at the recent 150th commemoration of the Colonial Cottage. We have since written to the Wellington City Council asking them to redress this situation so that history is not changed by omission. We understand that the book *Making*

Good on Shaky Ground is now out of print and we will support the Colonial Cottage staff in their effort to see if another print run can be produced.

I was delighted to be invited to Wanganui Branch to speak at their luncheon in August 2007 and was able to share with them some letters written by my paternal grandmother back in 1937 which recorded family history of Litteton 100 years ago. I was sorry not to be in a position to accept an offer to visit the Bay of Plenty Branch too but hope to redress that situation maybe later this year when my work commitments have lessened.

Due to a high demand for office space in the Wellington CBD we were faced with a huge rent increase for the very mediocre space that we occupied. Luckily, we were presented with an opportunity to move to the Thorndon Bridge Club Building in Tinakori Road – a move that is proving to be most suitable and worthwhile. A splendid effort by members of the Executive and ably led by our secretary Janet Robinson meant the shift went smoothly. Thank you everyone.

With the computer age moving along at great speed we are acknowledging just what an important role the internet plays in all our lives. We have been blessed with having the talents of Glen Robertson on our Executive and he is well-advanced with plans to getting the New Zealand Founders' website up and running. We are confident that this will make a huge difference to raising awareness of the Society and could well boost our membership.

As President I was invited to the launch of the fourth book in a series regarding the settlement of Wellington by Maori in the 19th century. This occasion was held at the Wellington Public Library. Sandra Clarke was the co-author of this work.

Finally we remember those of us who have passed away or who have resigned because of age or ill-health. It is with regret that we note in

particular the passing of the following members. Jack Glengarry died on 7th October 2007. He was Chairman and National Councillor for the Wanganui Branch from 2000 to 2004 when he stood down because of poor health. Jack also edited the Bulletin and agreed to be the Society's Publicity Spokesman. Vi Jolly was a committee member of the Waikato Branch of the NZ Founders Society for 16 years; Vi was Chairman at the time of her unexpected death on 14th September 2006. Priscilla Mitchell was born 7th December 1907, died Totnes, South Devon, England, 29th July 2007, aged 99. She was the great-great-niece of Edward Gibbon Wakefield and the last surviving descendant of his brother Daniel, New Zealand's first Attorney-General.

I wish to thank all the members of the Executive for their contribution to the running of the Society. Each committee member has a particular strength which has made this inaugural year for me as President to be as smooth as possible. We have been fortunate to have Joan Dickens, Wairarapa Branch and Michael Norris, Wanganui Branch attend our meetings. Also, I must thank Janet

Robinson, our National Secretary, for the sterling work she has done.


I am a keen but not terribly proficient golfer and have travelled to Australia many times with my golfing buddies particularly whilst my husband was setting up our business in the United Kingdom.
