

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THE SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW ZEALAND FOUNDERS SOCIETY PRESENTED BY THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

One of my major goals for this past year was to get our web site up and running. A lot of work had already been done by our own Glen Robertson and we were introduced to a web master who has a particular interest in history and genealogy etc who we thought would be the one to help us through the next stage. This in fact turned out be so, but then we started exploring further on what we could and could not do whilst still remaining clear of any privacy issues. On this front we had a lot of input from members of the various branches that I had the privilege to visit over the year.



What the new web designer had proposed was amazing and certainly would have taken the Founders to a new level but once we started down this path we then started to learn so much and especially just how much we needed to learn before we could go any

further. We are now back to where we started and whilst my goal of having the site up and running before the end of 2008 has failed, we now have a clearer idea of what we need to do. I still see this as the way of the future for the Society and we do desperately need more members to continue on the work of preserving our heritage for future generations.

Having a lot fewer business commitments this year and being settled in our new premises, enabled me to visit three of the branches, namely Wanganui, Bay of Plenty and Hawkes Bay. Each of these trips gave me the opportunity to meet with some wonderful people and hear such amazing stories of individual members. On behalf of the Society I would like to thank the Hawkes Bay Branch for their generous donation of \$2,000.00 for the Study Award Grant

Whilst in the Bay of Plenty it was fascinating for me to have a member come up to me and talk to me about the gun accident that happened to my maternal grandfather which was mentioned in the letter that I read out about my family history in Lyttelton. Prior to



this I had never given any thought as to how my great-grandfather could have damaged two of his fingers with a gun and then it was explained to me that it would have been a musket and

he would have been tamping the gunpowder down the barrel and it would have accidentally fired. A very small detail but it took on such a personal note with this explanation. I think it is stories like these that really make up the fabric of the Society. There are so many articulate and devoted family historians and genealogists amongst our members and at some stage some of these stories will get on to our own website.

I am pleased to report that a plaque has been installed inside the Colonial Cottage acknowledging the part the Young New Zealand Founders Society members played establishing the museum. The plaque states:

"This plaque was placed in recognition of the contribution by the New Zealand Founders Society to the restoration of 68 Nairn Street and the establishment of the Colonial Cottage Museum."

Finally we remember those of us who have passed away or who have resigned because of age or ill-health. We remember Joyce Mackenzie, Past Chairman of Wanganui Branch from 1989 to 2000 and editor of the Bulletin 1992-2000 which includes a special historical Bulletin of the Founders Society. Joyce became a member of the Wanganui Branch in 1979.

I would like to thank the Members of the Executive who have made my life so much easier as your President, and also, particularly to thank Janet Robinson who continues to be the glue that holds our Society together. To everyone of you, thank you for your continued encouragement and support to our Society.



It is my pleasure to present this 2009 Waikato Branch Report. At our 2008 AGM, as your new Chairman, it was pleasing to have members agree to rescind the motion passed at the 2007 AGM,

to increase the annual subscription. With re-organisation and management the Secretary/Treasurer and I were sure that we could cover Branch expenses without the need to increase the subscription. This has proved to be correct but will need to be closely watched.

Early 2008 the Treasurer and I applied on behalf of the Waikato Branch to be registered as a charitable entity with the Charities Commission regarding exemption from taxation. After several months we were eventually notified that we did not meet registration requirements due to clause 7a of the New Zealand Founders Society Constitution. The commission did suggest that, as a Branch of NZ Founders Society Inc. we could automatically be included if our parent body was accepted. However, earlier this year NZ Founders Society Inc. was also rejected for the same reason, clause 7a, therefore a Special General Meeting was called to amend the Constitution by deleting clause 7a. Due to this our Branch may be liable for a small amount of tax. We have had an interesting and successful twelve months.

The speaker of our 2008 AGM was ill so I substituted with a talk on the history of the NZ Founders Society Grant/Scholarship and circulated two of the published books for members to see. This aroused considerable interest.

At the June meeting we were privileged to have as our speaker Dr Deborah Challinor who is a writer/research/historian with a PhD in New Zealand history. Her subject was "How to use History to present Fiction". Dr Challinor first published non-



fiction before very successfully turning to fiction with historical accuracy. In August I reported on the Wellington National Council Meeting and Annual General Meeting. Our Waikato Branch remit was "That the Study Grant/Scholarship be

increased in monetary value and be more widely advertised". The

Trust Deed already allows for increased monetary value which has not been used. Some applicants, meeting the Trust requirements, have been declined and gone on to publish successful books. This meant NZ Founders Society missing out on what we saw as the intent of the Award and the possible publicity. Our remit was subsequently amended to "The Study Grant should be more widely advertised". This was moved, seconded and carried.

Another remit was also passed on improving public awareness of NZ Founders Society and a further remit "that the website be up and running by Christmas 2008". No remits went forward to the AGM as they had all been dealt with at the National Council. There was however discussion about the website and a report given on the Study Grant as well as the President's Report and Annual Accounts.

Following my Wellington report, one of our members, Jenny Gardiner gave us an insight in to all the months of work involved in organizing a Family Reunion.

At our October Luncheon Meeting we were delightfully entertained by our Secretary/Treasurer, Carolyn Smith, who talked with enthusiasm about her unexpected trip to China and the Beijing Olympics. It was amazing how much was involved!

After our well-attended Christmas Luncheon Meeting in November, we were thoroughly entertained by our speaker Michael Easther, a retired G.P. Michael is an actor who has appeared in T.V. commercials and films as well as in over sixty shows. He is also an author and regularly features in *The Waikato Times* as Flim Flam.

Our meetings resumed in February after the Christmas break. This meeting involved having our usual enjoyable luncheon at the Te Rapa Racecourse before 36 of us car-pooled to visit the

wonderful property and earth-rammed home of Graham and Diane McBride at Te Kowhai. Here we had a most informative talk and tour. This meeting was arranged for us by committee member, Bruce Murcott.

I acknowledge the willing support given by all the committee without whom we could not function as well. wheelchair bound for some time. The past year has been a challenge:


- (a) The introduction of the unpopular capitation fee resulting in the increased membership fee.

On Sunday, 30th March, we held our Annual General Meeting at the Heritage Hotel, Rotorua that was well attended by members. Our guest speaker, Mrs Shona Porter from Hawkes Bay, created intense interest with her knowledge and skilful presentation of her subject "Newest City OnThe Globe". The 1931 Napier earthquake caused the building of a new city and the creation of the now World Famous Art Deco City.

27 July, the Tauranga and Kati Kati meetings were combined. Held at the Armitage Hotel, 54 members were entertained by Doreen McLeod from the Interpretation Centre, Newmont Waihi gold-mining operations. The visual overhead display of the relocation of the historic Cornish Pump House held the interest of members.

On Sunday 28th September we had 52 members attend an interesting meeting held at the Classic Flyers Museum, Mount Maunganui. This was our first attempt at providing variety in our venues and it proved to meet favourably with those members who attended. A superb three course meal was served after which Andrew Cormlie, CEO of the Museum, gave an informative lecture

on the history of the museum and its future plans. He was delighted when one of our Te Puke members presented him with an autograph, obtained many years ago, from the famous aviatrix Jean Batten. Afterwards members were guided through the museum complex with its large collection of gircraft

The 48 members who attended enjoyed a guided bus tour round this attractive mill town followed by a delicious meal at the Cosmopolitan Club. Tansy Bliss, Kiwi Project Manager, Department of Conservation, gave an interesting lecture on the Mighty River Power project to save the Kiwi. Her presentation of recorded Kiwi mating calls and pictures of the breeding facilities was a fitting end to a very pleasant and informative outing.

As your representative on 9th June I travelled to Wellington to attend the Annual General Meeting of the NZ Founders Society and the National Council Meeting held at the Wilton Bowling Club. Audrey & Ian Henderson and Moina Garland attended as observers. Audrey also represented the NZ Historical Society. The declining numbers of the Society are cause for concern and as our President stated "No doubt some are questioning our relevance and the role that we play, but I think it is even more important now that we remember, discover and record the stories of our ancestors and the trials and tribulations that affected them when settling into this wonderful country."

In 2014 the Founders Society will be celebrating their 75th Anniversary and it is hoped the occasion might be marked on a grand scale. It is pleasing to note that a committee is following up on an idea of a commemorative stamp suggested by Terrance Stenson from our Tauranga Branch.

I am of the opinion the Society's investment funds will have suffered losses due to the financial crisis, and the reduction in interest rates on bank deposits will also have an affect on total equity.

We are saddened by the bereavement of several of our members during the year and the resignations due to ill-health, travel difficulties and re-locations. A big thank you to those members who have handled the affairs and phone lists of their individual Branches.

I want to thank our Treasurer, Lorraine Wilson-Perrott for her efforts during the years. Our members owe our unpaid secretary, Audrey Henderson, a huge vote of thanks, as without her secretarial skills, commitment and knowledge the Branch would be at a loss. I personally cannot thank Audrey and Ian enough for the help they have given me during my term as Chairman. I will miss the almost daily e-mail contact! After serving on the executive for eight years I regret I will be unable to hold any future executive position and wish the members and the society well.



February: The "Mission" was the venue for our Annual Founders Day Luncheon. An excellent meal was served in the Chapel followed by a talk by Mr Dan Miller, co-author of the newly-published book "Napier's Medicine Men 1860-1950".

April: Fifty members attended the Annual General Meeting held at the Napier Woollen Mills, now 105 years old. Over the last decades the husband and wife team, Anne and the late Frits Vink, have with their tenacity and entrepreneurial skills, restored the buildings and grounds to a commercial venture (Historic Places C Classification) to become in their time a Wool Carding Company. Arms Museum, equestrian centre and available premises for functions, weddings, etc. After an interesting talk and tour we enjoyed a lovely afternoon tea provided by Anne.

May: Following lunch at the old Union Hotel Ahuriri, seventy-one members moved to the old National Tobacco Company building



and were given an excellent power-point presentation of the past, present and the future plans for these famous Art Deco buildings by their new owners Mr Tom McKimm and his son of Big Save Furniture. June: Our Winter Luncheon was held at the Hawkes Bay Club, Napier. Mr Art

Verschoor, Past President, spoke of the difficulty immigrants have in a new country.

August: An interesting talk and tour was given by their Archivist, Gay Robertson, at the Woodford House Girls' College, founded in 1894 by Mabel Hodge. When it outgrew its original site the late Thomas Chambers of Tauroa Station, Havelock North gave the land for a new school. The first buildings were designed by W.J. Rush and re-opened in 1911.

As we did last year, we are again in the heart of Christchurch city here at Pomeroy's in this historic building. Indeed we are in a most historic, but often overlooked, part of our city on the corner of Fitzgerald Avenue and Kilmore Street on the banks of the Avon River.

During 2008 we enjoyed a range of functions with members and their families and friends. We are often joined by friends and some have even joined just as a Founder or Associate member.

Your small but dedicated committee of Shona Ward, Secretary/Treasurer, Noeline Hansen, Annabel and Graham Tapper, June Moore and Elizabeth Wolff with me as Chair has continued to provide a regular variety of not-too frequent



functions. We do hope you have and will continue to enjoy them
Our functions during 2008, following our wonderful March AGM in the beautiful surroundings of the Charlotte Jane Boutique Hotel in Papanui Road, were well attended and

It was the favourite hotel of Charlie Ballin (of Ballins drinks) and the hotel is said to still have a ghost walk its corridors following the unsolved murder of the publican many, many years ago. The story has created an atmosphere and interest over the years.

My special thanks to Shona Ward for the tremendous work she has done this year and for a number of years now. Shona is retiring at this AGM from her joint role and we thank her and will miss her, not only has she done both jobs for us but she has also hosted us at her home for our committee meetings during her whole time as secretary.

During 2009 Graham Tapper organized a joint venture to have the Allan Bean Library at the (Christchurch) Burwood Spinal Unit to look after all of our library books. This has been a great idea. The books are always accessible to members and now can be accessed and read by a much wider audience. We thank Graham for this initiative that is benefiting so many more people now.

Our Branch financial position, although still strong, has again had a very small reduction in total worth from last year. The reduction in our asset value in 2007 was \$15 and this year it is \$21. Our total worth is now \$80,010 down from \$80,031. I trust that you will agree with your committee that we are well pleased with this result especially considering the continued and

increasing support we have made to our local community, as well as continuing to support our functions for your enjoyment.

Unfortunately, one of the principals of part of our mortgage has defaulted on the interest and principal due. Our solicitors, on behalf of ourselves and twelve other mortgage contributors, have arranged for a mortgagee sale of the property (two sections near Redcliffs) to recover whatever is available.

Your committee wishes to continue with our philosophy of strong financial support for members' functions and our ongoing community sponsorships. With reduced interest rates this will be more difficult but still worthwhile to do. Corcoran French, our solicitors since the formation of our Society, are withdrawing from the mortgage market. Our funds will be transferred to our bank, the ANZ. All of our interests will now be with the ANZ Bank.

We continue our ongoing commitment to Canterbury Medical Research Foundation with our annual \$1,000.00 donation being the second of our five year commitment.

Again we will continue our special sponsorship arrangement with Margaret Copland. It is wonderful to have her with us again as she presents in a live story show a presentation of a glimpse of the life in Christchurch of days gone by. This has continued to allow her to present her "live story" to school and community groups that could not otherwise afford to hear about a significant part of local Canterbury history in an interesting, visible and memorable way.

Our local history and community founding knowledge is being preserved, and communicated to a wider community base. Our Founders Society name, as a helping and caring sponsor, is also being promoted in a meaningful way. This sponsorship continues to be a practical commitment of your Society that you can all feel proud and privileged to be a part of.

We reflect on members, family and close friends who have passed away over the year. Our sympathy is extended to you and your families over your loss.

My thanks again to your small but dedicated team of committee members; Shona, Graham, Annabel, June and Elizabeth. Your personal time and support continues to be very much appreciated. I record our thanks to our auditor, Alan Winslade, for his contribution to complete the audit of our accounts, so ably prepared by our Treasurer Shona, for us as at 31st December 2008.

Finally, thank you all for your support of the functions and attendance here today. Your membership and support by attendance at functions makes our Society vibrant and interesting. Thank you for your continued support of our commitment to community financial support. Each of you may be truly proud that we are continuing to make a valuable, practical and visible contribution to the culture and education within our community.

Thank you for the privilege of being your Chairman and I trust you share with me, the pride in being a member of the Canterbury/Westland Branch of the NZ Founders Society.
