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# THE SEVENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW ZEALAND FOUNDERS SOCIETY PRESENTED BY THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

The highlight for me this year was our trip to New Plymouth and our participation in the re-Blessing of the Founders' Memorial on the waterfront after it had been relocated. There was a great turnout, complete with music and singing. The weather had turned a little blustery by this time but it was still a memorable occasion.

Prior to the Blessing, we (my husband Ian and I) had enjoyed lunch hosted by the New Plymouth Branch. Thank you so much to our Taranaki friends.

Ian and I had arrived the day before and had had an opportunity to look around the new museum on the waterfront. There were some wonderful displays and stories of the history of Taranaki and the Maori Wars. Then the following day getting further history from the Pakeha perspective. So rather than a Tale of Two Cities, this seems to me to be Two Tales of One City. I need to learn more.

Our web site is bringing new applications for membership slowly but surely. Any thoughts of our being rushed off our feet for new applications have been subdued. It must be said that we as a national society are struggling to maintain our membership levels. We have spent many an Executive Meeting thrashing around the subject of just how we can increase our members. Sadly we must face the fact that our depleting membership is simply a result of our members getting older. This is certainly the case' of Wellington and when I go through the reports from the Branches and note the number of deceased it is really

very, very sad.

Specifically this year here in Wellington, we lost Elisabeth Anderson who held the position of National Secretary from 1957-1992, a total of 35 years. Mary Buick-Constable was another stalwart from Wellington but who died in Auckland.

From Waikato we learned of Lynley Hyams sudden and premature passing. She had been a Founder since 1989 and initiated the Gisborne Branch where she served as chairman for two years and was the National Council representative. In 1997 Lynley was elected Waikato Branch National Council representative and became chairman of Waikato Branch in 2007.

Nola Jones from Wairarapa Branch was another sad loss after her involvement of 28 years holding office in every position over that time.

Two ladies from Wanganui also died, Mrs Dorothy Marks was Branch secretary for 14 years and chairman for five and reached the grand age of 104. Vera Thrush held the position of Branch secretary for a number of years.

On a positive note, the Society provided financial assistance for the reprint of Murray Moorhead's book 'Tales of Old New Plymouth' which is being under-taken by the Branch. The author's widow was at the aforementioned blessing.

Also in these last twelve months, under the stewardship of Bill Sheat, we are now a registered member of the Charities Commission which ensures our status as a bona fide society, with no tax implications. We also implemented the change to our Research Award which is now the Book Award and will be given to published authors.

So as I sign off on this report, I would once again like to thank my wonderful committee for their commitment to the society and their assistance to me. Special mention to Janet Robinson without whom I'm sure we would vaporize!

I had intended to serve as President for two years. I have now done three years and would like to be able to hand the mantle over to some new blood next year. Please contact me through Janet if you or someone you know is willing to take on this role.



There were a lot of memories shared as we watched and later purchased (at very modest prices) some of the entrancing delights.

We still meet at Kinder House (1857) as it has all that we require in facilities, room and rental. Also public transport is close at hand with stops for in and out of the city on either side of the road, and there is limited parking inside the grounds. We also continue to sponsor a guide dog and have, once again, visited the

training centre at Homai just south of the city. The fact that most of us now have the Super Gold Card helps with the required public transport by bus and train. Unfortunately, over the last year,



some members have resigned because of their age or moving into

residence at retirement and rest homes which they feel restricts their travelling. Also some of our long-standing members have passed away which is always a sad event for us and the families.


